#### From the desk of Rabbi Leonard Sarko

As our eyes turn toward November, Thanksgiving becomes forefront in our minds. Historically, what we call the First Thanksgiving was a pilgrim harvest celebration done in October 1621. We have a description of the account by Edward Winslow, a passenger on the Mayflower, who wrote about it in the document titled "*Mourt's Relation*".

There is a Jewish connection to this celebration. The Pilgrims would have been steeped in Bible. Many scholars, regardless of religious affiliation, believed that there was a connection between the Jewish festival of Sukkot and Thanksgiving. The Pilgrims were devout Puritans and Calvinists who came from Holland. In Holland, they would not only have known their bible succinctly, but would have been exposed to the Jewish population of that country, who were living there in relative freedom. The Pilgrims took many motifs from Jewish biblical history, including considering themselves "New Israel" and by moving to this new continent that they were moving to a "Promised Land". They defined their move to America in the same terms as the Exodus in the Bible. Although steeped in Christianity, the Pilgrims most likely thought of Thanksgiving as a new kind of Sukkot, a new world harvest festival.

Although established as a celebration by President Washington, it was Lincoln who fixed the day in November, instead of October, and made it an annual national holiday. (No – it was not the National Football League!) In the American Jewish world this led to a debate as to if Jews should celebrate Thanksgiving, as it was created by a Christian group. Should Thanksgiving be considered a type of religious holiday? The majority of the commentary indicates that it is no problem for Jews to celebrate this holiday as it is considered secular not religious. Further, there is no problem in the activities (parades) or foods (turkey) that would prevent a Jew from participating. Written opinions can be found from such scholars as Soloveitchik and Feinstein to support that perspective.

The direction the Jewish orthodox take is that halakhah permits one to celebrate secular holidays, so long as you avoid doing so with people who celebrate them through religious worship. In fact, the United States historically has been quite kind to the Jewish people, especially in comparison with other countries around the world. To take a day to honor and celebrate our citizenship and the gratitude we feel towards the United States, is proper and appropriate.

Optimal security would be to have one officer at each door during all services. I am hopeful that, if there is grant money available for next year, I will have the time to secure armed security at no cost to the Congregation. The only other possibility would be to create a fund or rely on some generous Congregants to cover the cost. There will be a discussion of this matter at an upcoming Board meeting.

### JEWISH BOOK MONTH -NOVEMBER 22-DECEMBER 22, 2019 THIS MONTH READ A JEWISH BOOK

The Jewish Book Month is a tradition that began in 1925 when a Boston librarian, Fanny Goldstein, decided to set up a display of Judaic books at the West End Branch of the Boston Public Library for one week and called it Jewish Book Week. In 1943, it was extended to a month and is now promoted by the Jewish Book Council.

From the end days of the Weimar Republic through the rise of Hitler and the atrocities of World War II, four women risked their lives to defy the Nazis. Jennifer Chiaverini in her new historical novel, *Resistance Women*, reimagines the real lives of Mildred Fish Harnack, an American who moves to Berlin to pursue her doctoral degree in American Literature and reunites with her German husband, Arvid; Greta Lorke, a German woman returning from studying abroad at the University of Wisconsin, hoping to become a writer in the theater, and Martha Dodd, the politically naive daughter of the newly appointed American Ambassador to Germany. These women are linked together in a fascinating web of relationships with fictional character, Sara Weitz, a Jewish student of American literature. As Hitler and his Nazi Party wield violence and lies to seize power, Mildred, Arvid, and their friends resolve to resist. All four women and their partners find themselves drawn into an underground espionage network, later called the Rote Kapelle by the Nazi. The network gathers intelligence and connects with communist cells seeking to destroy the Third Reich.

<u>Resistance Women</u> is inspired by actual events featuring the lives of ordinary people determined to resist the rise of the Nazi party, sacrificing their own lives and liberty to fight injustice and defend the oppressed. Read this novel to find out if a careless, single radio transmission will turn the resistance women over to the Nazis.

#### **CEI BOARD MEETING MINUTES, Wednesday, October 16, 2019**

**ATTENDING:** Julie Goldstein, Mary Ellen Kane, Terri Katzman, Joel Last, Virginia Lieberman, Irene Rothschild, Rabbi Sarko and Marion Slone

**MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING:** The minutes of the September meeting were approved as published in the October Bulletin.

RABBI REPORT: The main focus this past month was, of course, the High Holy Days. So the board knows what that entails. Rabbi was responsible for the following services beyond the Friday night Shabbat Services: Slichot, Rosh Hashanah Eve, Rosh Hashanah Morning, Tashlich, Yom Kippur Eve, Yom Kippur Morning, Afternoon Study Session, Afternoon Service, Yizkor, and Closing Service. In the upcoming month we have a Sukkot celebration and Simchat Torah. In the past month, Rabbi went to Greensburg-Salem High School and met with four classes to talk about Judaism. A class from the Aquinas School is coming to CEI on October 22. He met with the Ministerium this past month. On October 24 he will be attending a group titled VOAD, which is trying to organize actions in the community if an emergency occurs. He met with a number of groups to introduce himself. The most interesting was with the director of the YWCA. They will be meeting a second time when she will help CEI define grant facilities that are local to this area. He did two funerals on request from B'nai Israel Cemetery.

**TREASURER REPORT:** Yahrzeit contributions are up. Memorial Book contributions are up. Fair Share is also up slightly also. Julie changed CEI's electric supplier, so electric bills should be lower now.

**PRESIDENT REPORT AND ADMINISTRATION:** Irene had arranged for armed security for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur with Captain Stafford of the Greensburg Police. We arranged for coverage for three hours for Erev Rosh Hashanah, Rosh Hashanah, Erev Yom Kippur, Yom Kippur morning and Yom Kippur afternoon contingent on the grant from Federation. Erin Wyland from Federation could not guarantee the grant until Friday morning, September 27, and Irene was out of town, so she canceled the coverage. The Board needs to further study and discuss the security issue for next year. Rabbi Lenny and Irene will attend a meeting on Thursday, October 24, held by the Westmoreland Voluntary Organization Active in Disasters (VOAD) that is supporting the coordination of planning efforts by volunteer organizations responding to a local disaster. The meeting will be held at the Westmoreland Museum of American Art. High Holiday services went very well and were well attended. Irene thanked Mitch Goldstein and Joel Last for doing excellent work as our cantorial soloists. She also thanked Rachel Gau for playing a solo version of Kol Nidre on her violin. She did an excellent job. Many thanks to Mitch, Adam and Eric Goldstein for doing another great job in blowing shofars. Irene thanked Shoshana Halden for doing a fine job in recruiting and organizing all of the readers and everyone who volunteered to participate in services. She also thanked Terri Katzman and Mary Ellen Kane and all of the cooks/bakers for putting together another delicious Break-the-Fast. That kind of volunteerism is one of the things that help to make CEI so special! There will be a special Oneg in honor of Amy Karelitz's special birthday and of Rabbi Lenny's birthday on October 18, 2019. Rabbi Lenny and Irene discussed commemorating the Tree of Life shooting at Shabbat services on October 25, 2019. On behalf of the Board, thank you to Yvonne Bureau for donating the drinking water system that is in the fover by the front door. She donated the equipment and the 5 gallon bottles to keep it filled. Yvonne has been doing a terrific job in cleaning and organizing the kitchen with the help of Jack Wilder.

**SISTERHOOD:** A big 'Thank You' goes to Terri and her committee for the excellent Break-The-Fast meal after services. The Congregation really appreciates it. Many thanks to Julie for underwriting the event! Helpers are needed to set up the rummage sale on November 3. Helpers are needed to help sell the merchandise and clean up on November 4 and 5. On November 14 at 7 PM, Karen Sarko will lead a book discussion of <u>Women's Minyan</u> by Naomi Ragan. The discussion will take place in the CEI social hall. Light refreshments will be served. The Hanukkah Gift Shop will be opening after Thanksgiving.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

**Caring:** Rabbi Lenny has been in touch with Jon Lewis, Paddy Barnhart and Jerry Shpargel. **Fundraising/Special Events:** Taste of Westmoreland: Terri has had no feedback from Joel Reiter since the meeting the committee had in August. She would like to request that someone other than herself be the contact between Joel, his committee and the board. The \$500 down payment to Pitt was not been made on time so a decision must be made soon. Terri reached out and has not heard back from him. Julie is willing to contact him by phone and get an answer.

**Membership:** We are reaching out to the former members of the Monessen Synagogue.

**Physical Properties:** Richard got a bid to replace the worn-out lights that shine on the front of the building and install the alert lights for the armed security system. Joel moved the bid be accepted. Julie seconded the motion. Passed. Rabbi Lenny asked for solar lights or some reflectors to better identify the entry to the driveway in the dark.

**Social Action:** We have been contacted by the Red Cross asking whether we would like to host a blood drive on either December 24 or 26. The Board, after discussion, decided that a blood drive, especially on those dates was not a good idea. Past blood drives have not been successful. 155 bags for meals on wheels will be filled October 20 at 10:00 am. Non-perishable food and monetary donations for the Westmoreland Food Bank are still being accepted in the lobby.

**Transition:** Irene will attend a VOAD meeting with Rabbi Lenny on October 24. Rabbi and Terri will attend the Diversity Coalition Program at Lakeview on October 17.

New Business: Dan Reiter has resigned and moved to Tennessee so the Board needed to elect a new vice president. Terri has agreed to take his place. Irene nominated Terri to be vice president. Vote was unanimous. Rabbi Lenny proposed that we concentrate on new members by giving them a reason to come. Our event schedule should be widely available. Rabbi Lenny suggested one big fundraiser and then possibly some smaller ones. The Taste is a possibility, but not certain at this point. Rabbi Lenny suggested a Winter Arts and Crafts festival, perhaps in February. Not many arts festivals are held in winter so artists may be eager to participate. We would need to rent a facility and seek artists for the weekend. Revenue would be raised through charging the artists for a space. Admission would be free; 50/50 raffle tickets could be sold. It may be possible to get sponsorships also. Ramada has the space and parking. Rabbi Lenny has done this before and assured us that there is not a lot of physical labor. Terri, Marion, Virginia will help Rabbi with the research on these ideas.

It was recommended that another person or two should be taught how to work the security system to cover for Bea if she is on vacation or sick. Right now there is no one else who can do that. **Adjourn:** Julie moved the meeting be adjourned. Mary Ellen seconded the motion. Meeting adjourned at 8:35 pm.
