From the desk of Rabbi Leonard Sarko

I always think it is fun to view on television, or the Internet, the news as it happens across the globe. People of different races, sizes, colors, and cultures all seem to be doing something similar. The news as it is presented is not much different in Japan or China as it is in Greensburg.

It has been within our lifetime that our world has shrunk. When I was a small boy, the world did not go much further out than my neighborhood and certainly not much beyond the border of our country. Today, what happens on the other side of the globe is as relevant and known, in an immediate sense, as what happens in our own neighborhood. Perhaps in some cases it might be easier to know what is happening across the globe than it is next door.

Yet culturally, we Jews often look at the world through very different eyes and actions. The Jewish approach to New Years, Rosh Hashanah, is very different than the secular New Year. The Jewish people gather together at synagogues and Temples. We pray together, we think about the past year – our sins, and also what we were proud of. We examine ourselves and our community. Lastly, we try to re-center ourselves and plan to do better the next year. Unlike the revelry and party like atmosphere of the secular approach, the Jewish method is done with much seriousness and focus of judgement on our acts as individuals and as a community.

Do not misunderstand – the Jewish people like to party as much as other cultures and religions. I have said many times that there is no such thing as a sad Jewish holiday. Even Shabbat should be full of joy, song and happiness. Yet unlike the secular New Year, we take the time to make our holidays and celebrations far more relevant, significant and meaningful. The day after we party on December 31st, we simply take a new breath as a person and then begin to plan forward, if we plan at all. After the Jewish New Year, our thoughts have already been focused, so on the following day we are ready to forge ahead.

I would like to borrow a prayer from Rabbi Rosove: “May we pursue the Biblical prophet's vision of peace, that we might live harmoniously with each other and side by side, respecting differences, cherishing diversity, with no one exploiting the weak, each living without fear of the other, each revering Divinity in every human soul.

May we struggle against institutional injustice, free those from oppression and contempt, act with purity of heart and mind, despising none, defrauding none, hating none, cherishing all, honoring every child of God, every creature of the earth.

May the Jewish people, the state of Israel, and all peoples know peace ..., and may we nurture kindness and love everywhere.”

ALFRED RATNER LIBRARY NEWS by *Shirley Shpargel*

Alice Hoffman's new historical novel, The World That We Knew, set during World War II, finds light in that dimming time period. Hoffman travels to a hidden world of magical realism built amid the horrors of the Holocaust and produces a tale of love, loss and what it means to endure. The World That We Knew begins in 1941 Berlin, where a young Jewish mother, Hanni, knows she must smuggle her daughter, Lea, out of the city before the Nazis take her. She turns to a rabbi for mystical help, but finds the rabbi's daughter, Ettie, is the one to help Lea through magical means. Ettie crafts a golem they call Ava to guide and protect Lea. They begin a dangerous journey through Nazi occupied France where Ettie finds a new purpose, and Lea finds her soul mate and Ava finds that she is much more than a single-minded creation. Throughout the next three years of the war, each woman tries to survive while also pursuing her own process of self-discovery.

Alice Hoffman was approached by a Jewish Holocaust survivor after giving a reading at a library in Florida. This woman told Alice Hoffman that the author needed to tell her story of how she had been a hidden child in France during World War II. Although she was a Jew, she had been sent to a convent by her parents to be raised a Catholic. Her parents' great sacrifice was the reason she had not been arrested by the French police or German soldiers. It was the reason she had survived. She was concerned that her story would not be remembered and the cruelty of that time would be forgotten. Alice Hoffman came to understand that fairy tales are perhaps the most autobiographical of all stories, containing the deepest psychological truths. These are the stories that explain the sorrow of real life, but also that once upon a time there was a woman or a girl who managed to rescue herself. Once you tell a story, you are not forgotten, and that's what Hoffman realized while writing about the journey of these three characters who refused to be silent. Lea, a young girl who is sent away from Berlin to ensure that she would survive; Ettie, the daughter of a rabbi, who was brave in the real world as she was in the world of magic; and Ava, a mythic being whose only purpose was to protect the stranger who affects her life in ways she could not have imagined.

CEI BOARD MEETING MINUTES, Wednesday, December 11, 2019

ATTENDING: Julie Goldstein, Mary Ellen Kane, Bruce Kaufer, Terri Katzman, Joel Last, Virginia Lieberman, Irene Rothschild, Rabbi Lenny Sarko. **Guest:** Josh Estner

MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING: The minutes of the November meeting were approved as published in the December Bulletin.

RABBI REPORT: Rabbi Lenny had a meeting with the head of the NCCHE and the staff, including Sister Gemma. He made clear that when seeking support or cooperation from CEI and the Greensburg Jewish Community, they must go through CEI, Rabbi Lenny and the officers. He is working with the YWCA on finding funding through grants for equipment to stream services and educational activities. Cindy Leonard has been very helpful. In order to secure the grants, CEI must be able to provide an unaudited fiscal report. Rabbi continues to visit shut-ins regularly, including in Monessen. There are now three people in the process of conversion. Marsha Wong will present a seminar on funeral and burial practices in late winter or spring.

RESTRICTED FUNDS REPORT: Josh Estner reported on the status of the restricted funds and investments. The rise in the stock market has bolstered our holdings somewhat, however, there is a limit to how long those funds will last since there is a need to draw from them to meet regular expenses. Fair Share contributions do not fully cover CEI's needs. Since there are still a few funds that are designated for specific uses that are not relevant anymore, Irene will contact the families connected to those funds to request that they be rolled over into the Endowment Fund to support the future of the Congregation. There was also a discussion of the investment strategy. Directors were satisfied with Josh's explanations.

TREASURER REPORT: CEI received a very nice donation from the estate of Norma Brodell. We thank the family very much. Letters will be going out soon to renew Fair Share pledges and encourage Congregants to consider increasing their donations to support the Congregation as we still struggle to meet on-going costs.

PRESIDENT REPORT AND ADMINISTRATION: The Blind Association will pick up the ten boxes of old records and shred them for \$100.00. After shredding they will send an authentication notice along with the invoice. Please note that the Millstein Fund has been rolled into the Endowment Fund. The former Festival of the Jewish Arts fund will be changed to the Arts Fest Fund. The Frosty Fun Arts Festival committee is making progress in planning the upcoming event. Irene will be contacting volunteers to help the day before and the two days of the event, February 8-9, 2020. It would be terrific if we could get the same willingness to volunteer that we got for the TOW! Irene circulated the sign-up sheet to read the announcements during Shabbat services. On behalf of the Board of Directors, Irene authorized holiday bonuses for Bea and Scott.

SISTERHOOD: The next Sisterhood meeting will be at DeGennaro's at 6:30 pm on January 14, 2020. Calendars are printed and delivered. Thank you to Terri and Shoshana for organizing the Hanukkah Dinner and to Terri for organizing the Sisterhood Hanukkah Party. Mary Ellen and Terri met to plan activities for the second half of the year.

MEN'S CLUB: Please take the time to look around the building at all of the cleaning out that the Men's Club and Rabbi Lenny have been undertaking, especially in the former Education Room and the coat room. Thank you!

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Fundraising/Special Events: The Frosty Fun Arts Festival is moving along. The contract with the Ramada has been signed and the flyers announcing the event have been emailed or distributed.

Membership: Mary Ellen has reached out to one potential member, but has received no response yet.

Ritual Practices: Shoshana Halden held a meeting of the Ritual Practices Committee on November 24, 2019 to discuss the High Holiday services, procedures, and Rabbi Lenny Sarko's performance. Almost all of the members enjoyed the services and liked the Rabbi's involvement of as many people as possible. Some members requested that the Yahrzeit lights be kept on all day on Yom Kippur. Also, members wished that the name(s) of their late loved ones be read separately, rather than referred to in a generic grouping. The violin performance of Kol Nidre was enjoyable and it was suggested that Rachel receive a token gift. It was also suggested that each of the volunteer cantors receive a token gift in appreciation for their participation. Mitch and Joel declined to accept. It was stressed that all services start at 7:30 pm. The name tags were positively received by most people. It is recommended that the name tags be used only during the High Holidays. Rabbi and Shoshana will try to give out the parts in a more efficient manner next year. Rabbi will announce the readings that are not in the book so people will not look for them in vain. Overall, Rabbi Lenny is very well accepted and liked!

The Jewish Scholarship Service of Greater Pittsburgh (JSS), formerly Central Scholarship and Loan Referral Service, of the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh provides need-based scholarships to qualified students in the Greater Pittsburgh area. This program is administered by Jewish Family and Community Services. These funds are made available through the generosity of families who have established endowments through the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh, Jewish Community Center, Jewish Women International of Pittsburgh (*formerly B'nai B'rith Women*), National Council of Jewish Women, Jewish Home for Babies and Children, The Pittsburgh Foundation, and Rodef Shalom Congregation.

All scholarships are distributed on the basis of demonstrated financial need. Depending on the scholarship fund, factors such as academic achievement, field of study, school attending, and Jewish and general community involvement will also be considered. In addition, the applicant must be Jewish, reside in Allegheny, Westmoreland, Beaver, Butler or Washington County, and need financial assistance to attend an accredited institution of higher education as either an undergraduate or graduate student.

The 2020-2021 JSS online application is available at jfcspgh.org/scholarships. **All applications are due February 12, 2020.**

First-time applicants must be interviewed. All applications should be submitted as early as possible to ensure processing.
