From the desk of Rabbi Leonard Sarko

In the Torah portion we read a few weeks ago we had the famous golden calf incident. Many people believe that the calf was a type of god idol. It actually was not. Moses had acted as a mediator between the people and God. It is interesting to note that Moses was not the secular leader of the people - that was Joshua; he was not the religious leader of the people - that was Aaron. Moses had no formal title or position. Yet he could mediate and interpret between God and the people. In that respect he had a significant status and was relied upon by the entire nation. Moses went up on Mt. Sinai to receive the Torah. The people expected him to be up there for a specified amount of time. When he did not return the people became anxious. They wanted a mediator between them and God. They thought that Moses had died. They built the golden calf to act as that mediator. So in the strict sense of the term, the calf itself was not considered a god. Yet it was an idol. In that sense, it went against the very foundation of Judaism.

Judaism tends to be fairly conservative in its approach to most of the mitzvot, laws and ordinances. The one exception is idol worship. Concerning idol worship it goes to the extreme. The Hebrew word for prostration is transliterated as yishtachavoo. When you run across this word in the chumash, within just a few verses, something bad is going to happen. It makes you feel as if you do not want to even see the word. Jews do not prostrate. There is a wonderful set of passages in the Talmud. It says that we place no figures, pictures or representations of people, animals or other such things within our sanctuary. Why? Because if a non-Jew should pass by and look into the sanctuary and see people davening (swaying as they pray) and there is a figure in the sanctuary, the angle of the view may make it seem as if the Jew is praying to the figure. We do not wish even non-Jews to get any kind of impression that we may be praying to an idol. Therefore, we place no such figures inside the sanctuary.

In our modern sense we can have many different kinds of idols. Money, land, and other things we wish to possess in the extreme are types of idols. Addiction, in any form, is a kind of idol worship. We can idolize power. As human beings we can manipulate science in any number of ways. This can make us feel as if we are above everything else - godlike. In Judaism we do not raise people to god-like status. None of our patriarchs or even Moses was given that status. In Judaism we reject our modern golden calves. In Judaism we reject idol worship in whatever form it takes. It is a foundational concept of our religion.

Also, the nominating process has started, so if you are contacted by someone on the Nominating Committee, please consider becoming an integral part of the functioning of the Congregation by becoming a Director. The Congregation is only as strong as its 'weakest link'. What keeps our Congregation strong, is many members each doing even a small part in operating and maintaining the building and the Congregation. A good example is how well Yvonne Bureau is maintaining the kitchen. Every time I enter it, I marvel at how clean and well organized it is! The other day, I went to temple to meet Rabbi Lenny for our monthly meeting and saw Jack Wilder helping Scott install a cable to allow the video equipment in the sanctuary to connect to the internet in the office. Sisterhood does a great job at planning interesting programs and by sponsoring the Tu B'Shevat Seder and the upcoming Passover Seder. Book donation:

<u>The Woman Who Fought an Empire: Sarah Aaronsohn and Her Nili Spy Ring</u> by Gregory J. Wallace (biography), donated by Shirley and Jerold Shpargel in Memory of Judith Pripstein.

Judith Pripstein was librarian of the Alfred Ratner Library and helped organize the library into categories as it is today. She spent hours typing shelf cards for the books in the library so they could be located on the shelf, often spending her lunch hours rushing from teaching at Greensburg Salem Middle School and coming to the Congregation across the street to work. She retired after 2003 from the library, but frequently stopped in on her visits back to Greensburg before her death this past year.

The 2020 winners of the Sydney Taylor Book Awards have been announced. Named in honor of the author of the classic All-of-a-Kind Family series, the awards recognize books for children and teens that show high literary standards and portray the Jewish experience. The winner of the Picture Book category is <u>The Book Rescuer: How a Mensch from Massachusetts Saved Yiddish Literature for Generations to Come</u> by Sue Macy and illustrated by Stacy Innerst. This biography tells the story of Yiddish Book Center founder, Aaron Lansky and his commitment to rescuing Yiddish language books. Lansky's grandmother traveled with a suitcase full of Yiddish books when she emigrated to the United States. She arrived, but the suitcase never made it. This story inspired Aaron to save the world's Yiddish books for future generations. The illustrations by Pittsburger, Stacy Innerst were inspired by the visions of Marc Chagall. His paintings often reflected his Jewish life in the

shtetl of Russia.

In 1980, Lansky founded the Yiddish Book Center where the collection is now being digitized and placed online available for free to anyone who wants to read them. Boxes of Yiddish books arrive everyday, and he and his volunteers still go and search for more. He works with forty-three people at the Center where Yiddish translators are trained, and high school and college and adult educational programs are offered. A new textbook is being released that makes learning Yiddish quicker, easier and fun. The Yiddish Book Center is located in Amherst, Massachusetts where exhibits on Jewish history and culture are on display, and the original Yiddish printing press from the Forverts daily newspaper and gardens dedicated to Yiddish writers can be seen. CEI BOARD MEETING MINUTES, Wednesday, February 12, 2020

ATTENDING: Mary Ellen Kane, Terri Katzman, Bruce Kaufer, Joel Last, Virginia Lieberman, Irene Rothschild, Rabbi Sarko and Marion Slone.

MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING: The minutes of the January meeting were approved as published in the February Bulletin.

RABBI REPORT: Rabbi Lenny has met with two grant foundations about the internet project. He attended the Ministerium meeting and the Diversity Coalition meeting. He has been asked to do a seminar on Judaism for the Diversity Coalition and will serve on the Racial Justice Committee. He also attended the ribbon cutting for the Blackburn Center's new expansion. The Yom HaShoah service will be held in Latrobe on April 26. Rabbi is helping with the planning. He visited Seton Hill University with Sister Gemma and met with several people including the President of Seton Hill. Rabbi Lenny has been invited to speak at Westminster Church on March 11 and has been invited to present a "mock" Seder for a church in Morgantown. He has also been invited to speak again at Greensburg Salem High School. CEI has been invited to be a sponsor for the JFilm Festival. A decision will be made after the Board has an opportunity to review the contract. The Board discussed the outreach through the internet plan that Rabbi Lenny has proposed. Seed money to fund the purchase of the hardware necessary to allow for streaming of Shabbat services and other events has been donated by some generous congregants. Two grants have been submitted to fund expanding the project to allow for interactive programming, such as on-line religious school or bar/bat mitzvah training, adult education and other applications. The objective is to be more accessible and draw in more participants. This outreach may have the potential to raise some funds to sustain the congregation. It is important to put together a plan and to do due diligence to identify verifiable needs and realistic targets in the greater western Pennsylvania area. It is best to be prudent and move carefully. There will be no CEI monies used to fund this project and expansion beyond the initial streaming of services would be totally dependent on the success in getting grant funding and the results of the research on the needs of the communities.

TREASURER REPORT: Julie was unable to attend the meeting. Questions were raised about the large increase in utility bills. Bills resulting from building and grounds should be paid from the Capital Fund, not the Endowment Fund or general funds.

PRESIDENT REPORT AND ADMINISTRATION: Irene requested the date of the annual meeting be changed from June 7 to June 14. The Board agreed to the change. Rabbi has a commitment for March 11, so we will move the March board meeting to March 18. Rabbi helped Irene complete the PA security grant application. CEI requested \$25,000.00. If that is not sufficient to cover security upgrades to all of the downstairs windows, we will do as many in the Social Hall as possible and apply again next year for a grant to cover the remaining windows, as well as, those in the kitchen and library. There was discussion about totally arming the security system. The Yahrzeit Fund is doing well. The average donation is about \$35. The old books will be buried on April 19. Congregants who wish to appropriately dispose of books that use the name of God in Hebrew may add them to the congregational books.

SISTERHOOD: We received a lovely thank you note from the Blackburn Center for the purses with toiletries. We sent approximately 30 purses to them. Sisterhood sponsored the Tu B'Shevat Seder on February 7, 26 people attended and it was a fun evening. Sisterhood Shabbat Service will be March 20. Cori Liptak and Marion Slone are asking for readers and participants. Sisterhood is sponsoring the Oneg and asking Sisterhood members to bring in or send in baked goods, fruit, or cheese and

crackers. Sisterhood is sponsoring the Family Passover Seder on April 15. Sisterhood Closing Donor Dinner will be on May 26. It will be at Old Route 66 Grill at 6:30 pm. We will order off an adapted menu.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Fundraising/Special Events: Donations from those who had agreed to sponsor the arts fest have been instead donated to the General Fund. Thank you to those who were so generous. Irene will look into an offer she received promoting Klezmer and Immigrant's Music concerts as fundraisers. The promoter claimed that a grant from the PA Council on the Arts was available to cover the cost. She will get more details.

Physical Properties: Richard has one estimate for the new windows. They would be security windows over the existing windows. He does not yet have an estimate from the company that had given an estimate several years ago. He got an estimate to move the downstairs monitor closer to the downstairs door and to add a monitor in the front foyer. It would cost about \$1500 from SSA. He does not have an estimate to install the warning light above the FOB readers in the front and back. Don Young is working on it. Mr. Young will repair the front sign light and bill us for parts and labor. The stained glass window in the hall has been damaged. Richard has arranged for a repair. It will be done in place and arrangements will be made through Scott to get access to the building.

Social Action: The next **Meals on Wheels** project will be April 26.

Technology: CEI now owns the website domain name. There will be no change in the links to the site.

Old Business: Virginia is putting together the nominating committee. Mary Ellen will be the other board member on the committee. Virginia will ask two congregants to participate also. There will be one open position on the Board this year.

Adjourn: Meeting adjourned at 8:35 pm.


